Catalog Description of the Course

Introduction to brief history and trend of U.S. transportation planning; basic concepts and the issues in transportation; Analytical skills in travel behavior analysis and travel demand modeling; transportation economics, finance, and policies; sustainable transportation.

Course Objectives

The objectives of this course are to provide students with a comprehensive introduction of current transportation planning issues, methods, and policies within a broad community and urban planning framework. I also like to bring an international perspective given the fact that many transportation problems are global. The course serves as a pre-requisite course for advanced transportation courses at graduate level.

Primary Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion of this course, students should be able to:

- 1. Formulate basic transportation planning concepts, theories, and principles.
- 2. Evaluate the technical and political contexts transportation planners work in.
- 3. Understand the interactions between transportation, land use, and the environment.
- 4. Apply travel demand management and modeling skills to transportation problems.
- 5. Compare different travel modes and assess their roles in the transportation system.
- 6. Distinguish the successful features of innovative transportation planning schemes.
- 7. Gain critical knowledge of sustainable transportation.

Course Organization

This course will be provided fully online. Home assignments and handouts are going to be uploaded to the "Course Documents" section on Blackboard. Students are expected to upload their homework to Blackboard or email it to the instructor.

Examinations

There will be one mid-term exam and one final exam. Students will take exams online. The exams will be composed of short answers and essay questions. Both exams are based on the text book and the lecture. The final exam will be comprehensive.

Writing Assignment

Students will be required to identify a transportation planning problem (locally or nationally) and finish a 3000-word paper on that topic in two phases. The first phase paper will be returned quickly. If the instructor finds the community or the problem identified inappropriate or irrelevant, the student will be asked to re-find a community or a planning problem, and re-submit the paper.

Writing assignments turned in after the beginning of class on the due date will be penalized 10% for each day late.
