specifically on pages 220-3 to 220-5. Note that this version differs from the hard copy most of us have in our possession in that it includes the numerically ranked recommendations that were to come out of our subcommittee, including a possible recommendation for program discontinuance.

We have subsequently been told that there is an interim document that does not involve this subcommittee in matters of program discontinuance, but has as our charge the evaluation of programs undergoing "routine" review. I note that the On-Line APM is titled:

Policy on the Procedures and Guidelines for the Periodic Review of Academic Programs May 10, 2004

and does not have "Interim" in its title. My understanding is that this is the official document until it is officially replaced. The hard copy document which is called "Interim" does *not* include these categories:

- 1. Recommendation to Approve a Program with Notation of Exceptional Quality
- 2. Recommendation to Approve a Program of Quality and Promise
- 3. Recommendation to Approve a Program for Conditional Continuation
- 4. Recommendation to Suspend a Program
- 5. Recommendation to Discontinue a Program

The part of our Charge which should still apply would be:

The campus program review committees will review the reports provided, interview representatives of the program and the administration as appropriate, and provide their recommendations based on the reports provided. They should also comment on the outcomes assessment process in the department and on the SOAP. The committee report should be completed no less than one month following receipt of the material and should be delivered to the review officer(s).

If we wish to break these down into action categories for our Program Review Meetings, they would be: (I have added a few comments of my own.)

- 1. Review the reports provided, (which typically include the Self Study, the External Review, the Chair's Response, and the Dean's Response.)
- 2. Interview representatives of the program and the administration as appropriate. (This reflects our past policy of bringing the principal players together when some issues need clarifying or resolving.)
- 3. Provide recommendations based on the reports provided. (However, under the Interim Guidelines, we wou' not be providing the recommendations as categories 1 through 5 as given above, which would imply a de facto faculty committee ranking of the health of the program. Instead, our recommendations should assist the program in the realization of their goals.)

- 4. Comment on the outcomes assessment process in the department and on the SOAP.
 - . Complete the report [within] no less than one month following receipt of the material.
- 6. Deliver the report to the Review Officer(s).

I would suggest that we discuss these six items and clarify our perception of the meaning of each at our next meeting.

What is the current status of the three tracks?

Dr. Omolayo: The three tracks were based on the interests of our students. Because of attrition of our faculty we do have problems [with coverage]. External review suggested one general track. But many students are interested in GIS, others in Environmental issues. We need to add depth to provide these emphases. We expect the economy to improve and for the crisis to abate. We want to try our three tracks for two years or so.

We have 6 full-time and 2 FERPers. We have one part time and one full time lecturer. The technician was lost, the admin asst was lost (added to the College and shared). A computer technician is shared. No instructional technician.

Can advanced courses be farmed out?

Dr. Omolayo: We have problems with students taking a long time. We do look for outside courses if we have graduating Seniors.

Is GIS offered elsewhere?

Dr. Omolayo: Yes, but the approach may not be what we need. We want to teach GIS from the ground up to fit our program. Other programs only teach to their own applications.

What about ISIS?

Dr. Omolayo: GIS people from all over campus were brought together but "it didn't work out." "It just died." In a recent meeting with ISIS it was suggested that they work together (in meeting with Provost?) This week is GIS day organized by ISIS. We tell our students to go to the activities. We (geography faculty) are open to cooperation with ISIS.

How will this cooperation help your program, given that there are no teachers [of regular semester courses] in ISIS?

Dr. Omolayo: Maybe ISIS could offer internships and work on real projects. ISIS is self-supporting with grants and contracts.

How about Outcomes Assessment?

Dr. Omolayo: We have a document already. It is a small embellishment of the old one [for the old curriculum before the three-track new one]. We have not started any assessment activities yet.

Is there a target date for beginning assessment of student learning?

Dr. Omolayo: At the moment we are more concerned with the small number of faculty we have. [Adding assessment to their duties would be difficult.] Perhaps we do need to set a date.

How do you propose to cover the three tracks in the next two or three years? (Both numbers of faculty and numbers of students.) Can you modify the tracks, perhaps short term, to solve immediate problems?

Dr. Omolayo: We are currently doing a search for an additional faculty member.

How many majors do you have? (and FTE)

Dr. Omolayo: 25 majors right now. Also 185 FTE, a lot of which is in GE and Liberal Studies. Every one is teaching at least one GE course. We offer 9 or 10 Geography 4 for Liberal Studies. Also Geography 115,

Violent Weather - four sections.

Any recruitment plans?

Dr. Omolayo: We have developed a recruitment plan given to the Dean last semester. The Dean urged us to increase our FTE's so we can hire. Then things go frozen. I want to build the majors, though.

Can you temporarily concentrate on one of your tracks, GIS maybe?

[At this point your secretary had to leave for class, so his reply and additional comments were not recorded.]

Remarks:

Dr. Wallace: There have been concerns with the enrollments in Geography and in Social Science. Suggestions to increase recruitment in Geography have been taken to heart. We have authorized a new faculty search.

We noted that the external review suggested one track instead of three. They do need to devise an updated SOAP. They are in danger of losing a large fraction of their majors [due to graduation], which they will need to replace. They need to look at scheduling some classes once per year so there can be enough students in them so they will make.

Dickerson: We have been encouraging departments to drop courses that haven't been offered in a long time. We suggested to Sam that some of their courses might be farmed out to other departments.

Wallace: Geography really wants to hang on to their Three Tracks.

Perry: How realistic is it for them to get to the 50-60 majors they propose?

Wallace: They are around 25 now. They lost students when they cancelled [a teacher training Liberal Studies course].

Perry: How about the ISIS center? Do they want to get involved with them.

Wallace: I haven't heard that they are interested in this. They are very reluctant to substitute courses from other departments.

Dickerson: Could they maybe focus on two of their three tracks?

Wallace: They really don't want to do this.

[A general discussion ensued about where the department might be going, and where they can show emphasis, and focus their recruiting efforts. It was noted that they have 9 majors in Physical-Environmental, 14 in Technical (GIS), 2 in Human-Systematic.]

Kemp: How about their problems with fragmented administrative support?

Wallace: They wanted to keep their faculty over in the Science Building. The other support office problems are not yet resolved.

[We completed our meeting with a general discussion of the consequences of their focusing on one or two of their three tracks. For example: can courses be suspended without losing them (yes). There was much concern over the ability of Geography to maintain three tracks at the present time.]

We will develop a report at our next meeting. Chair Perry will be sending out some material to help our committee members prepare for this.

We have visitors from the Department of Music, and from the Arts&Humanities Dean's Office:

New information: Music had three full retirements over the summer (Golden Handshake). Two tenure track and one lectureship searches are now in progress. George DeGraffenreid is returning half time to the Music Education program.

Searches: Composition (TT), Musicology (TT), and Piano (lectureship).

Zellmer commented on the very high quality of the self-study and on the actions of the department with regard to future planning.

What was the problem with the fees for recording? This was a misunderstanding. We need to distinguish between recordings for future employment vs. recordings of specified projects.

How about the suggestion about the group lessons? We have tried this, and find it useful in some classes.

Matt Darling had done a survey to check out some of the suggestions about how the students spent their time, e.g. ensembles vs private, etc. The majority of the students felt the mix of time was about right. The external assessment team talked to only about two students.

What about ethnomusicology? This is still a lecturer position. We asked for a TT position but didn't get it.

What about the orchestra and string program? We have wanted to have this for some time, but it has been a struggle. The Marching Band is doing well, but strings suffer. We do have a string orchestra, but not a full symphony orchestra.

What about the University High School? We have no connection with them. A few of the string students might take one of our courses, but none of the music faculty teach over there.

We now have what we need to prepare our report on the Department of Music.

Meeting Notes:

Tarek: The department is dedicated to excellence in teaching. We started at CSM, went to Engineering, where we ran into problems. There was lack of technical support and we didn't have dedicated laboratories in the College of Engineering.

We wanted to attract students to our Masters program. At the moment we are going through a down-cycle, which is nation-wide. We want to get back on track. We need to develop an action plan. New areas of expansion: BA degrees jointly with other colleges and departments on campus.

Walt: We have a program with very solid foundations. We had an emphasis on teaching programming, but that changed in the 90's. The future now is in Computation. E.g. computation in linguistics and cognitive science. We want to work with other programs. Physics might have a joint masters in computational science.

Tarek: We got a company to relocate here in Fresno. We got shares for that, which was sold and made money for us. From that experience we may be able to do more in the future.

Is the visa problem affecting both BS and MS? Yes, even in the BS program. We are getting competition from Europe now too. Students trained in Europe will buy equipment from Europe, so the whole country is involved.

Was the move to the College of Science and Mathematics (CSM) prompted by physical facilities--labs-or just a better atmosphere? In a meeting with Dean Wong he asked for a list of what CS would need and a plan. They will have retreat to work this out.

There was a lot of discussion of how the 5 technicians in Engineering couldn't be scheduled to keep the computers running. Bad management.

The external review team mentioned courses in Computer Security, what about that?: We are open to working with computer engineering on security and networking labs. The computer engineering department has too few staff to handle the program they want to deliver in Engineering. But CS is now looking to emphasize three areas: Web programming, software engineering, and computer visualization.

[Note added following the meeting: From the CS web site, a link to the Catalog, http://www-catalog.admin.csufresno.edu/current/compscidgr.html shows that the following areas of specialization are listed: "The advanced sequences allow the individual student to pursue concentrated work within such areas as computer architecture, artificial intelligence, databases, compilers, operating systems, computer science theory, computer graphics, software engineering, programming languages, networking distributed systems, and parallel processing." Does this mean they plan to scale down the scope of what they now offer?]

What will your new program look like after the move to the College of Science and Mathematics

(CSM), and how will some of the funding issues that have arisen be resolved? The new program is yet to be decided. There are ongoing efforts to solve the budgeting problems. (Details were provided about budgeting models and similar issues.)

New Question: How do you propose to deal with declining enrollment? We want to emphasize our three areas (computer visualization, web programming, software engineering). We want to develop more joint programs with other departments, e.g. linguistics, which will bring in more FTE. We are going to have to be able to respond quickly to changes in the market.

Do you want to offer programs for professionals who want to update their skills? We have offered 8-week classes in the evening in hopes of attracting local people, but we didn't get very many. Industries in the valley are not that intensive in computers. This may be changing as industries move into the Valley. We may need to move into distance learning.

It takes a long time and a lot of effort for us to develop the new courses needed to stay current, even for introductory classes. This will require campus resources invested before we can attract the students to it. Our MS program developed rapidly, then fell off, and is now suspended.

How about Certificate programs? We did attract some students who came in through Extended Education. These didn't directly add to our FTES, but they did "fill the pipeline."

How about the proposed BA degree? What are the national trends? Do you have any needs assessments? We plan to keep the BS we have now. The BA would have fewer required courses. The BA would accommodate those with a strong interest in other areas. There is no formal needs assessment. Our BS is pretty much just one option. The BA allows us to combine people with interest in other areas to add computer to this.

How about Outcomes Assessment? We have not done as much as we should have. We started out implementing some of the measurements. We found we needed to use "embedded assessment," so now we are trying to change to this. There was also the Indirect and Direct methods of assessment to be interpreted. There was substantial discussion about this process.

What about accreditation? There is now a Computer Accrediting agency. The main thing we fail on is the lab equipment. For the department as a whole we are not giving accreditation a high priority, although some faculty feel strongly about this. We are continuing to look at it. It may be less important once we are in the CSM. It can be a factor in attracting students. It is very much an emphasis in Engineering.

Because much of this information was new and was not well described in the documents provided to this subcommittee, it will require more than one week to digest this and come up with a report on Computer Science for us to discuss. Next week we will look at our next Program Review from Social Work Education.

Social Work Education

The self-study pointed out problems with their students being under prepared. A writing entrance requirement to the Master's program was mentioned. Their assessment measures showed that their graduated students did well one-on-one but did poorly on writing reports or handling quantitative information. The self-study also mentioned poor "gate-keeping" which allowed students into the program who would not do well.

There was also mention of technology problems with both students and faculty, which impede the use of

computer tools such as Blackboard.

Meeting Notes:

We had a lot of discussion about what we should put in our report about Computer Science. Our biggest concern is over the lack of curricular planning we see in the various reports before us. The original self study describes a rather vaguely worded view of the department; the external team focused on technical problems and computer labs; the Dean of the College of Engineering and Computer Science provided suggestions for how the program could be strengthened by staying in Engineering. In our meeting with computer science, we heard a verbal description of the future of the department that is not contained in any of the existing documents. We suspect that the department itself has not reached consensus on what they plan to do next.

The report must urge the department to create a clear view of what the "new" department plans to do in their new home in the College of Science of Mathematics. As part of this plan, the department must seriously pursue an Outcomes Assessment Plan so they can tell if their new programs are bearing fruit. Itad they done this seriously in the past, they might have learned why their current graduation rate is so low, for example.

We continued working on the wording of the Draft Report on Computer Science written by Dr. Perry. There will be an updated draft next time.

We hope to meet with representatives of Social Work Education next time. We were very pleased with their report, and were very gratified to learn that their Outcomes Assessment Plan actually provided useful results. It showed some areas where they can now direct their attention and improve their program. For example: lack of some basic student skills (reading, writing and math) identified in their self-study may be limiting the effectiveness of some of their students both in the program and after graduation. We applaud their success in measuring Outcomes and look forward to hearing about their future plans for improvement.

Gonzalez: We have a strong recruitment plan; majors are at 45. Liberal studies bring in FTES.

Leet: Good research and collaboration with Ag Econ, Education, and Business. We are farming out basic statistics to other departments and will do the more advanced Econometrics. Health Economics, Econonics of Crime, etc. are all doing well. We see ourselves as an Applied Economics department. Outcomes Assessment told us to shore up the students' basic stat (we will farm that out).

Advising: Going to on-line advising, but some students are not comfortable with that.

We are planning to suspend old courses. It seems better to drop the old and create new ones. We are in the process of cleaning up our catalog.

Leet described several programs they have going involving research with other departments like Ag Econ, and programs involving the community. Service learning as such is not part of existing courses, but community involvement is happening through cooperative programs with other departments.

Courses and programs for the major are still serving them well.

The recruitment plan: How is outreach working? Are you working with the outreach person in the College? How current and accurate is you website? What is your "brochure" aimed at? Advising or recruiting? From the response it would appear they have kept on top of a good, integrated web design used throughout the College.

GE is about 66% of the total FTES. Liberal Studies is large also. Majors are up. The current 45 majors is a good number. Econ majors tend to go into the same market as a business major (but not specialties like accounting, etc.). There is more of a service orientation, so they might go into things like government.

Being in the same hall over in Peters with Ag Econ has led to good friendships and cooperative programs. In the dim past Econ and Ag Econ were at loggerheads. This is not true now. Cooperative programs with things like the West Fresno Coalition were suggested.

The program seems to have a good sense of direction and is planning well for the future.

Ag Econ. On page 3 of the Dean's Response we find reference to a "structural problem" with the makeup of the faculty. Given retirements and other loss of faculty, can the department continue to offer their current curriculum? Do they have problems mentoring their junior faculty? There are also questions about what the direction of their future curriculum might be after new hires. The Ag Econ department has historically had a strong stand-alone program that probably does not need significant revisions. Are there any reasons today to consider combining forces with Business or Economics?

They also need to complete the revision of their SOAP and continue gathering data from their existing SOAP. What is their progress in both existing assessment and the revisions aimed at streamlining the old SOAP? Has there been any implementation to date?

The external review noted that there is currently no Advisory Committee. Given the strong ties with local agribusiness, why is this so?

We have data about FTES in the self-study, which shows a modest decline in recent years, but how have the numbers of majors fared over the same time? There have been changes in GE, which might explain overall FTES. [Dianne found the figures. For the number of FTES: 252 in 1999; 196 in 2003. For the number of majors: In 1999 they had 68; in 2003, 53.] We will ask them if the loss of faculty has impacted their ability to offer their program. We will meet with them on April 25.

Meeting Notes:

Jane M: We have been busy meeting with students and others and looking at curriculum since the time of the self-study. Reaccredidation is coming up in a couple of years, so we are getting ready for that.

Dean: We are interviewing candidates for a tenure-track position. We plan to add more.

There are 12 faculty and 500 students currently. 350 UG plus 150 Grad students.

The SOAP has been helpful, as has discussions with the accrediting agency. Faculty are interested in refreshing the curriculum also. More writing and more critical thinking are suggested.

Yaw: What plans do you have for culturally effective programs? Our content is being strengthened; we plan to offer more tools for studying these things. Cultural diversity is hard to deal with. Our students are lauded for their cultural competence.

What about the gatekeeping? Will the curriculum changes at the UG level better prepare them for the Grad program? Our enhancements will help this, but "gatekeeping" is a different issue.

Are you looking at how students are doing early in the program to see if they will be successful later on? There is a screening before they go into the field. If they don't pass the screen, they probably would need to take additional courses. They have found problems with students' ability to write and do math, but have seen some improvements over the years since some faculty have really been working with the students in these areas, and have gotten some improvements.

How do you get advising done for 500 students? Students are assigned to advisors, but not all of them make use of this. We have orientations for the curriculum, which reaches all the students. We have the Road Map and materials of our own. We put information on the web site and on Blackboard. Field placement provides more opportunities for advisement.

For the cultural competency certificate they take courses within the department and some outside as well. There are about 6-10 students per year who seek this certification.

It is important that we recognize who these students are and that they want to be here and do well. What can we do to continue to promote this? Perhaps there could be a two-week pre-semester workshop to reinforce critical skills for better success.

After our guests had left, we once again commented on what a fine program this was and how active the

department was in trying to improve what they had done.

There was some discussion about how well the learning objectives for specific courses were being communicated to the faculty teaching them. The SOAP has the matrix in it, but the self-study did not. We might add something about this to our existing draft.

Meeting Notes:

Jim Casey: We have been identified as an outstanding undergraduate program. Take great pride in that. Lately we have struggled a bit with faculty numbers. Priorities: Hire new faculty is most important. Review our curriculum and make sure it matches the current agribusiness climate. Implement SOAP. Second Level: establish research priorities with new faculty, look at graduate program.

In last three years we had two assistant professors who left, we have FERPers, Shield will be going into FERP, a joint appointment has resigned, Casey has resigned. As of this morning we had a new faculty member accept an assignemnt. So in the Fall of 05: Full time: 4, FERP 2, Lecturers 4. We are advertising for another position (for department chair), but the search just closed with zero applicants. We will need additional part time faculty to get our curriculum covered. There are available people. The market for PhD's in Ag Econ is a lot more attractive than we are, so it is hard to attract people.

There is currently a lot of sharing and alternative classes in other departments. The degree of dialog with the School of Business and Economics is quite large these days; much more than in the past.

We now have 185 majors, down from something in the 200's. FTES is down just under a hundred right now. This may be in part due to fewer but larger Ag businesses out there.

Faculty mentoring was discussed. This is going to have to be carefully addressed, since there were some failures in this area in the past.

There is a lot of emphasis trying to recruit Hispanic Students. They tend to be attracted more to non-ag areas.

Why two degrees? Why Business and Ag Business? There are historical reasons for this, plus given the size of the Ag industry, we have done well in the past focusing on this.

Can you give us an update on your new SOAP? We plan to move the third year back into the second year. Several surveys need to be done earlier. We need to get some surveys and focus groups done that have been planned. We are behind on our schedule. None of the listed activities have been done at this time. We suggest you look at your courses vs. objectives matrix as you plan your new curriculum. Other departments who have done this have found this to be helpful. Start by doing something now, even if it isn't as comprehensive as you would like. Learn as you go.

There was a lot of discussion of their Master's program, in which only one course has been taught over the last several years. They may do better currently be working with the School of Business to support MBA students who want to do an Ag emphasis. Diane provided a schedule to them of what would happen next. They will need to have an action plan, perhaps even this semester.

Meeting Notes:

The SOAP from the Smittcamp Family Honors College is quite different from others we have seen, in that there is not a set of courses to be fit into Goals and Objectives or into a Matrix for assessment. Zellmer had previously discussed this with Dr. Rodemeyer, Director of the program; he indicated that this SOAP was to be about the Honors program itself, not courses that are designated "Honors."

The Goals and Objectives section is divided into three main categories: Individual, Cohort (activities engaged in as SFHC events, and others such as College Bowl), and Community (e.g. service-learning). If these are Goals and Objectives, many of them listed are very broad and hard to measure. We had difficulty deciding just what would need to be measured here.

On the final page of this document, they list Program Goals. These seem clear and well-defined. Since there is no claim here for Objectives, there are no measurement methods listed.

This document seems halfway between a SOAP and a Program Review. This makes it difficult for us to evaluate it. Many of the elements of a SOAP, such as how to make the measurements, and how the information will be used to promote curricular improvements, seem incomplete or missing. Our draft report, to be considered at our next (and last) meeting of the semester will list some of these concerns.
